## **Panel 1 Description**

The debate about how best to provide effective and affordable pharmaceutical coverage in Canada has been a long standing political challenge in our country. But as the federal government engages stakeholders in a new Health Accord, finding a path forward for pharmacare in Canada is crucial - not only for our aging population but also uninsured or underinsured individuals and families across Canada.

This panel will bring together a diverse set of perspectives to find common ground on the role of pharmaceuticals in the Canadian health system.

## **Panel 2 Description**

The world is beginning to rethink how health resources are spent and attempting to reshape the incentives provide in the delivery of healthcare. The system currently rewards quantity rather than quality of healthcare delivered. The current fee for service physician compensation model rewards doctors based on the number of interactions with a patient irrespective of the whether the interventions actually benefit the health of patient. Similarly, a drug company's rewards are typically proportional to a drug product's utilization even if the drug may not have provided positive health outcomes.

There are ways to shift the way we track and reward what is achieved by our health interventions. In the end, sustainability will never be about "how much" but "how" we spend our health dollars.

This panel will debate the policy changes required to put in place a system that would allow for the measurement of outcomes and a move towards value based healthcare?
